




Introduction to the AI Continent Action Plan

The European Commission continues to roll-out its Work Programme 2025, with the publication of the Al Continent Action Plan on 9 April 2025¹.

Structured around 5 key pillars, the Al Continent Action Plan puts forward important initiatives, policies and concrete actions aimed at making the EU a global leader in Al.

Overview of key elements and drivers of the Al Continent Action Plan²



Computing Power & Infrastructure

- Al Factories, Supercomputers and Al Factories Antennas
- Al Gigafactories
- InvestAl

These initiatives are often intertwined, and also tie into various others announced for 2025 and beyond, including e.g. the review and possible revision of the Chips Act.

³ Will target key industrial sectors with strong EU leadership, e.g. advanced manufacturing; aerospace; security and defence; agri-food; energy and fusion research; environment and climate; mobility and automotive; pharmaceutical; biotechnology; advanced materials design; robotics; electronic communications; cultural and creative industries (with a dedicated strategy to be developed in parallel) and science. Further, the public sector will be a 'leading strategic driver' of the Apply Al Strategy.

⁴ This will be a central information hub, and will allow stakeholders to ask for help, receive tailor-made answers and have access to technical tools, e.g., decision trees and other self-assessment tools, to help understand and comply with the EU Al Act. It will particularly serve the needs of smaller Al providers and deployers.



Opportunities to get involved

The Al Continent Action Plan identifies different opportunities where stakeholders can get involved. Here is a quick snapshot of some initiatives.

Public consultation and call for evidence to identify stakeholders' priorities and inform the Apply Al Strategy (launched 9 April 2025 - please see here)

Call for Evidence and targeted consultation activities with the scientific community to inform the Al in Science Strategy (launched 10 April 2025 please see here)6

Structured dialogues with industry and public sector reps to identify sector-specific Al-related deliverables and KPIs and inform the Apply AI **Strategy** (to be organised Q2-Q3 2025)

Calls from Horizon Europe and Digital Europe Programme (in health, cyber, energy, pharma/drug, electronic communications, aerospace, robotics, manufacturing, public sector, science, etc.), as part of the GenAl4EU initiative (launch Q1 2026)

Apply Al Strategy: Spotlight on regulatory simplification

There is currently a strategic focus on reducing the regulatory and administrative burden for businesses in the EU, as part of a broader drive to improve the EU's competitiveness. And despite having started to apply only in February 2025, this already concerns the **EU Al Act** too.

The European Commission wants to build on what has been learned so far from the EU AI Act's implementation, and identify measures to facilitate its application especially for smaller businesses. Through the **Apply Al Strategy** consultation launched on 9 April 2025, the European Commission is therefore also seeking to:

- Identify stakeholders' regulatory challenges in implementing the EU Al Act.
- Inform (potential) additional measures to facilitate compliance and possible simplification of the EU AI Act.

Based on the results, the European Commission notably intends to issue templates and guidance - something which the EU AI Act already provides for extensively. The consultation is also expected to contribute to a broader assessment of the adequacy of the EU's current tech rulebook, looking at the EU Al Act but also beyond - and with a particular focus on SMEs and small midcaps.

This ties into a number of initiatives that were already in the pipeline to review and simplify tech rules in the EU, including in 2025 through an evaluation of the legislative acquis in the digital policy area and an 'EU Digital Package' simplification initiative initially planned for Q4 2025, as well as the Start-up and Scale-up Strategy announced for Q2 2025.
